The Club donated \$345 to The Sheltered Workshop. They collected 16 pairs of used eyeglasses and 3 ink cartridges. Membership stands at 36.

Amherst – The Club held two meeting during the month...The annual Ray Puckett Amherst Lions Club Christmas Parade was a success despite the poor weather...this really starts off the Christmas season for the community. The Christmas Tree Sales went very well also...we sold all of the trees...the Amherst community really comes out and supports the club with this project...the folks know that the money's that we make go to good causes and help lots of people in need. The Club provided three pair of new glasses at a cost of \$285 to needy individuals. Membership stands at 13.

Appomattox Membership stands at 39. At the December meeting, Marie Martin, CEO of United Way of Central Virginia, provided information about United Way Services to the region and particularly to residents of Appomattox County. In 2008, 3,300 Appomattox County residents received services from United Way funded agencies with a value of \$220,000.

HEARING CONSERVATION

This is to update 24B Lions in our Hearing Conservation project for Fourth Grade students.

Since my report last August, the program has proceeded, not as fast as I had hoped, but it is finally getting presented in the elementary schools of Henrico County. We presented our program to 2 schools last month and the teachers told us that it was a good, informative program for the students. I made the presentations and Dave Bauer, a member with me on the Richmond West Breakfast Lions Hearing Committee, assisted in a presentation to 2 classes. Next week, we plan to talk to 6 classes, and will have 4 RWBLC members making the presentations. On October 5, the Henrico Elementary Division administration talked about our program and recommended it to 45 elementary school principals. There appears to be a lack of communication between

the principals and their teachers since then about this program. Last month, I called 2 principals who put me in touch with their lead Fourth Grade teachers. I plan to continue calling the schools and getting all 11 of us Henrico County Lion volunteers addressing the young folks, and in expanding the program in the District as needed.

I have been working with the Hanover County Schools for the past 2 years, who have shown interest, but have yet to make a decision. I presented the program to elementary physical education teachers December 1 but have yet to hear about their decision to use us Lions, present it themselves, or not to present it at all.

Thanks to Tom Young, Region II Zone I clubs have adopted the project for this school year. I presented the program at their meeting November 18.

Will you Lions join us in this worthy endeavor now? Many medical studies have shown that children are ruining their hearing for a lifetime due to long exposure to loud noises, such as listening to MP3 personal listening devices, music, etc. at maximum volume available in their environments. The European Union has announced that it will regulate the maximum volume that manufacturers can sell on their MP3 players. We have a Power Point slide presentation and 2 handout booklets and ear plugs to present to the students with our advice on protecting their hearing for the rest of their lives. The booklets and ear plugs are available on request from the VA Lions Hearing Foundation at 1-800-345-4615.

I have written all of the Lion Presidents in 24B and asked that they appoint hearing chairs to develop the program in the schools in their communities. Has your president done this? I challenge any and all 24B Lions to join in this endeavor to serve our children NOW. The kids' hearing will *never be better than it is now*.
